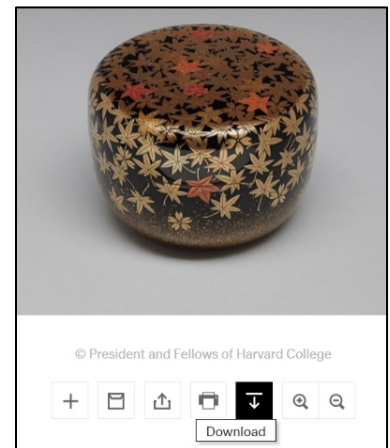


Harvard Art Museums Remote Resources for Teaching

[The Harvard Art Museums](#) are committed to interdisciplinary collaborations and work with faculty from across the university. The museums are home to approximately 250,000 objects that span millennia, media, and cultures. The collection of Asian and Mediterranean Art comprises objects from Asia and North Africa, as well as ancient Greece, Rome, Egypt, and the Near East. Many of the objects derive from Islamic, Buddhist, and Hindu traditions. The collection of European and American Art comprises drawings, paintings, photographs, prints, sculptures, and objects of decorative art from the twelfth century to around 1900. The collection of Modern and Contemporary Art dates from 1901 to the present day and includes drawings, paintings, photographs, prints, sculptures, installations, objects of decorative art, and of time-based media.
